
A climate equity vision for now

How we define the problem

Women* are the worst hit by climate change and have lesser resources to adapt or mitigate the climate impacts which affect different aspects of their lives and well-being. For example,



Livelihoods of women are impacted by climate change, especially for those working in the informal economy.








Women's health is affected due to the disruption of health services.

Girls are forced to drop out of school due to increased economic hardships.

Why do we think the problem persists?

Climate change exacerbates gender inequities that exist in our society especially for women who are poor and disadvantaged due to intersectional vulnerabilities.




The increase in systemic discrimination and power asymmetries will put the disproportionate burden of this crisis on women and disempower them limiting their ability to engage and take action.

However, women's leadership (social, economic and political) is critical to arrive at climate solutions and for integrating women from marginalised groups (like indigenous groups) into decision-making at all levels as this would help improve both- climate mitigation and adaptation policies and their implementation.

Our solution

Incorporating and implementing gender transformative climate strategies that will diagnose, intervene and transform basic causes of gender inequity that make different communities of women vulnerable to climate change and catalyse climate solutions embedded in mitigation, adaptation and resilience driven by women.

The strategies should:-



Focus on intersectional vulnerabilities of women from different communities.




Address the root causes of climate induced vulnerability of women and understand these intersectional vulnerabilities by constantly engaging with the communities of women.






Address climate as a political problem rooted in unequal power structures and oppressive social norms.



Focus on solutions driven by participatory decision making led by women at the intersection of mitigation, adaptation and resilience.



Engage and collaborate with state and local Government's schemes to support in climate compatible development.

Awareness and Education

Climate resources made accessible in different vernacular languages to engage in conversations around climate change and relevant solutions



- Continuous efforts to engage men and boys as part of the awareness and education drives.
- Trainings, platforms and opportunities for women reporting on climate in challenging geographies resulting in an increase in women centric stories in the regional media at state and district level and through local media platforms such as community radio.



Contextual communication material and tools made available to existing women's networks like women self-help groups, Accredited Social Health Activists (ASHAs) and Anganwadi Workers (AWWs).




Research & Innovation

Identifying gaps in approaches on gender and climate to respond to the needs of diverse communities of women.











Prototyping and testing approaches around insurance schemes and direct benefit transfer on financial inclusion of women living in climate vulnerable geographies and belonging to low income groups.



Pilot innovative approaches to prioritise women and increase the existing social protection cover based on intersectionality.





Collective perspective building on climate to increase resilience of women at the forefront of climate mitigation efforts (especially waste workers, landless labourers and Adivasi women).



Capacity building of PRI members, block and district level officials on increased responsiveness to health, WASH, clean energy, financial literacy and housing needs of women who are caregivers or part of the informal economy to build their resilience to climate change.



Develop spaces of learning and dialogue among respective decision makers and community of women to build a collective understanding of the problem and climate solutions.

Local Collectives

 Building new local collectives of women or strengthening existing ones with resources to work on climate compatible development* in their communities.



 Mapping of commons in urban and rural areas and creating local diverse collectives to conserve them for women's livelihoods.



 Strengthen local collectives to work with PRI members at village level to include commons for local livelihoods as part of the Gram Panchayat Development Plans (GPDPs).




System level networks

 Linking women most vulnerable to the climate crisis in rural and urban poor areas with livelihood options through Government schemes and existing federations.



 Creating a network of new cooperatives and federations that provide sustained income to women to build their climate resilience and focus on climate compatible livelihoods.





Building an ecosystem that supports and mentors communities of vulnerable women on resources, tools and knowledge on building climate resilient futures.
